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## Part 1

### The CEFR level of *Unlock* 3<sup>rd</sup> edition Level 3 (Reading, Writing and Critical Thinking and Listening, Speaking and Critical Thinking combined)

*Unlock* 3<sup>rd</sup> edition Level 3 covers level B1 of the CEFR. This table describes the general degree of skill achieved by learners at this level.

Skill	Learners will be able to:
Listening	<p>understand straightforward factual information about common everyday or job related topics, identifying both general messages and specific details, provided speech is clearly articulated in a generally familiar accent;</p> <p>understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure etc., including short narratives.</p>
Reading	<p>read straightforward factual texts on subjects related to his/her field and interests with a satisfactory level of comprehension.</p>
Speaking	<p>reasonably fluently sustain a straightforward description of one of a variety of subjects within his/her field of interest, presenting it as a linear sequence of points;</p> <p>exploit a wide range of simple language to deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling;</p> <p>enter unprepared into conversation of familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life (e.g. family, hobbies, work, travel and current events);</p> <p>communicate with some confidence on familiar routine and non-routine matters related to his/her interests and professional field;</p> <p>exchange, check and confirm information, deal with less routine situations and explain why something is a problem;</p> <p>express thoughts on more abstract, cultural topics such as films, books, music etc.</p>

<p><b>Writing</b></p>	<p>write straightforward connected texts on a range of familiar subjects within his/her field of interest, by linking a series of shorter discrete elements into a linear sequence;</p> <p>write personal letters and notes asking for or conveying simple information of immediate relevance, getting across the point he/she feels to be important;</p> <p>convey information and ideas on abstract as well as concrete topics, check information and ask about or explain problems with reasonable precision.</p>
<p><b>Communicative language competence</b></p>	<p>introduce people from different backgrounds, showing awareness that some questions may be perceived differently, and invite other people to contribute their expertise and experience, their views;</p> <p>collaborate with people from other backgrounds, showing interest and empathy by asking and answering simple questions, formulating and responding to suggestions, asking whether people agree, and proposing alternative approaches.</p>
<p><b>Communication strategies</b></p>	<p>intervene in a discussion on a familiar topic, using a suitable phrase to get the floor;</p> <p>initiate, maintain, and close simple face-to-face conversation on topics that are familiar or of personal interest.</p>
<p><b>Working with text</b></p>	<p>convey information given in clear, well-structured informational texts on subjects that are familiar or of personal or current interest, although his/her lexical limitations cause difficulty with formulation at times;</p> <p>convey the main points made in long texts expressed in uncomplicated language on topics of personal interest, provided that he/she can check the meaning of certain expressions.</p>

#### Listening

At B1, learners are expected to be able to understand speech that

- is clearly articulated in a standard accent and delivered relatively slowly
- concerns topics which are familiar.

Can follow much of everyday conversation and discussion, provided it takes place in standard speech and is clearly articulated in a familiar accent.

##### LISTENING AS A MEMBER OF A LIVE AUDIENCE

Can understand the main points of what is said in a straightforward monologue like a guided tour, provided the delivery is clear and relatively slow.

Can follow a straightforward conference presentation or demonstration with visual support (e.g. slides, handouts) on a topic or product within his/her field, understanding explanations given.

Can follow in outline straightforward short talks on familiar topics, provided these are delivered in clearly articulated standard speech.

Can distinguish between main ideas and supporting details in standard lectures on familiar subjects, provided these are delivered in clearly articulated standard speech.

Can follow a lecture or talk within his/her own field, provided the subject matter is familiar and the presentation straightforward and clearly structured.

##### LISTENING TO AUDIO, MEDIA AND RECORDINGS

Can understand the main points of radio news bulletins and simpler recorded material about familiar subjects delivered relatively slowly and clearly.

Can understand the main points and important details in stories and other narratives (e.g. a description of a holiday), provided the speaker speaks slowly and clearly.

Can understand the information content of the majority of recorded or broadcast audio material on topics of personal interest delivered in clear standard speech.

# Reading

At B1, learners can read and understand to a satisfactory level

- straightforward factual texts
- texts about subjects related to their field and interest

## READING FOR INFORMATION AND ARGUMENT

Can recognise significant points in straightforward newspaper articles on familiar subjects.

Can understand most factual information that he/she is likely to come across on familiar subjects of interest, provided he/she has sufficient time for re-reading.

Can understand the main points in descriptive notes such as those on museum exhibits and explanatory boards in exhibitions.

Can understand straightforward, factual texts on subjects relating to his/her interests or studies.

Can understand short texts on subjects that are familiar or of current interest, in which people give their points of view (e.g. critical contributions to an online discussion forum or readers' letters to the editor).

Can identify the main conclusions in clearly signalled argumentative texts.

Can recognise the line of argument in the treatment of the issue presented, though not necessarily in detail.

## WATCHING TV, FILM AND VIDEO

Can follow many films in which visuals and action carry much of the storyline, and which are delivered clearly in straightforward language.

Can catch the main points in TV programmes on familiar topics when the delivery is relatively slow and clear.

Can understand a large part of many TV programmes on topics of personal interest such as interviews, short lectures, and news reports when the delivery is relatively slow and clear.

# Speaking

## OVERALL SPOKEN INTERACTION

At B1, learners can communicate with some confidence, but may struggle to understand non-standard accents, rapid or extended speech, and idiomatic usage.

In general, learners can

- talk about familiar topics related to their professional field or personal interests (e.g. family, hobbies, work, travel and current events)
- generally follow clearly articulated speech in standard dialect that is directed at them, although they will sometimes have to ask for repetition of some words and phrases
- maintain a conversation, but may sometimes be difficult to follow
- take some initiatives, e.g. bring up a new subject

**CONVERSATION**

Can enter unprepared into conversations on familiar topics.

Can follow clearly articulated speech directed at him/her in everyday conversation, though will sometimes have to ask for repetition of particular words and phrases.

Can maintain a conversation or discussion but may sometimes be difficult to follow when trying to say exactly what he/she would like to.

Can express and respond to feelings such as surprise, happiness, sadness, interest and indifference.

Can start up a conversation and help it to keep going by asking people relatively spontaneous questions about a special experience or event, expressing reactions and opinion on familiar subjects.

Can have relatively long conversations on subjects of common interest, provided that the interlocutor makes an effort to support understanding.

**INFORMAL DISCUSSION**

Can compare and contrast alternatives, discussing what to do, where to go, who or which to choose, etc.

Can generally follow the main points in an informal discussion with friends provided speech is clearly articulated in standard language.

Can give or seek personal views and opinions in discussing topics of interest.

Can make his/her opinions and reactions understood as regards solutions to problems or practical questions of where to go, what to do, how to organise an event (e.g. an outing).

Can express belief, opinion, agreement and disagreement politely.

Can follow much of what is said around him/her on general topics provided interlocutors avoid very idiomatic usage and articulate clearly.

Can express his/her thoughts about abstract or cultural topics such as music, films.

Can explain why something is a problem.

Can give brief comments on the views of others.

**GOAL-ORIENTED CO-OPERATION**

Can generally follow what is said and, when necessary, can repeat back part of what someone has said to confirm mutual understanding.

Can make his/her opinions and reactions understood as regards possible solutions or the question of what to do next, giving brief reasons and explanations.

Can invite others to give their views on how to proceed.

Can follow what is said, though he/she may occasionally have to ask for repetition or clarification if the other people's talk is rapid or extended.

Can explain why something is a problem, discuss what to do next, compare and contrast alternatives.

Can give brief comments on the views of others.

**INTERVIEWING & BEING INTERVIEWED**

Can take some initiatives in an interview/consultation (e.g. to bring up a new subject) but is very dependent on interviewer in the interaction.

Can describe symptoms in a simple way and ask for advice when using health services; can understand the answer, provided this is given clearly in everyday language.

Can use a prepared questionnaire to carry out a structured interview, with some spontaneous follow up questions.

Can provide concrete information required in an interview/consultation (e.g. describe symptoms to a doctor) but does so with limited precision.

Can carry out a prepared interview, checking and confirming information, though he/she may occasionally have to ask for repetition if the other person's response is rapid or extended.

**OVERALL SPOKEN PRODUCTION****At B1, learners can give straightforward monologues on familiar subjects****SUSTAINED MONOLOGUE: GIVING INFORMATION**

Can report straightforward factual information on a familiar topic, for example to indicate the nature of a problem or to give detailed directions, provided he/she can prepare beforehand.

Can explain the main points in an idea or problem with reasonable precision.

Can describe how to do something, giving detailed instructions.

Can briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions, plans and actions.

Can say whether or not he/she approves of what someone has done and give reasons to justify this opinion.

Can develop an argument well enough to be followed without difficulty most of the time.

Can give simple reasons to justify a viewpoint on a familiar topic.

### ADDRESSING AUDIENCES

Can give a prepared straightforward presentation on a familiar topic within his/her field which is clear enough to be followed without difficulty most of the time, and in which the main points are explained with reasonable precision.

Can take follow up questions, but may have to ask for repetition if the speech was rapid.

Can give a prepared presentation on a familiar topic within his/her field, outlining similarities and differences (e.g. between products, countries/regions, plans).

## Writing

At B1 learners can convey information and ideas on abstract as well as concrete topics, and get across the points they feel are important.

### OVERALL WRITTEN PRODUCTION AND INTERACTION

#### WRITTEN REPORTS & ESSAYS

Can write very brief reports to a standard conventionalised format, which pass on routine factual information and state reasons for actions.

Can present a topic in a short report or poster, using photographs and short blocks of text.

Can write short, simple essays on topics of interest.

Can write a text on a topical subject of personal interest, using simple language to list advantages and disadvantages, give and justify his/her opinion.

Can summarise, report and give his/her opinion about accumulated factual information on familiar routine and non-routine matters within his/her field with some confidence.

Communicates with reasonable accuracy in familiar contexts; generally good control though with noticeable mother tongue influence. Errors occur, but it is clear what he/she is trying to express.

Uses reasonably accurately a repertoire of frequently used “routines” and patterns associated with more predictable situations.
